Dear Parents and Carers

Students also performed particularly well in the sixth form, with results above national averages across the board. We held our presentation evening on the 22nd November which was a lovely event and a pleasure to celebrate the achievements of our young people.

Bad Weather

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Outdoor Coats and Hats

As the weather takes a turn for the worse during the winter months, may I remind you of our high standards and expectations around uniform. Our students look incredibly smart, but the wearing of hoodies spoils the appearance of the smart uniform we have all worked so hard to achieve. All students have been told that as of the 8th January 2019, hoodies of any sort (zip front or pull over) will not be allowed to be worn to school. Coats can of course be worn over uniform but must be removed when indoors. Hats may of course be worn to and from school in the colder weather, but these must be kept in bags once in school.

Staff will ask students to remove outdoor coats in all buildings, including the canteen and hoodies will be confiscated from students if worn. Plenty of warning has been given to students and to parents/carers so that this is not an issue for anyone come January. As always, we thank you for your ongoing support.

Another reminder to please park safely outside of the Academy. We must ensure the safety, when entering and exiting, of all students and some parking continues to jeopardise this. Also we need to show consideration to local residents. We have asked the police to support us with this.



Events this term

DofE at Airedale Academy

As of 1 September 2018, Airedale Academy became a Directly Licensed Organisation.

The licence allows us to deliver Duke Of Edinburgh programmes to young people on our own premises.

At the moment, we are offering the Bronze Award to 11 students in Y9 and Silver Award to 45 students in Y10.

Students need to complete three sections: volunteering, physical and skills sections before they can go on a small expedition at the end of the year for 2 days, 1 night (for Bronze) and 3 days, 2 nights (for Silver).

Already we have seen a large array of activities started by students, from one student who has signed up to volunteer in a Cancer Research Charity Shop to students volunteering at our annual open evening for Y6 students.

Other students have signed up to develop skills, such as playing instruments, cooking, photography and painting, acting, writing and fishing to name but a few.

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Airedale Academy Recognised with Award For Excellence

Airedale Academy is excited to announce that we have been awarded the Community Alcohol Partnerships (CAP) award for Excellence in Education.

Our very own Principal, Liz Fairhurst, headed to Cardiff this week to receive the award on behalf of the school at the glittering CAP celebration event, which this year took place at the Welsh Assembly. Presenting the award, Josh Connolly, Ambassador for the National Association of Children of Alcoholics, said: "Alcohol education is an integral part of CAP and it is fantastic to see the interactive approach that the Airedale Academy takes. It sets students the challenge of developing and creating a piece of theatre as part of their coursework and each year the students have chosen themes linking to alcohol misuse. They research the subject with the help of CAP partners including Spectrum Community Health CIC, the Neighbourhood Policing Team and by talking to residents of a local rehab facility."

"In addition, the school organises a huge range of events and activities relating to alcohol misuse. Weekly drinking levels for 13, 14 and 15 year olds show a huge reduction, from 31.45% in 2016 to 7.31% in 2018. And its impact is far-reaching: it is part of Northern Ambition Academies Trust so a lot of its work feeds across to three other local schools, where many younger siblings are educated. Many congratulations to Airedale Academy!"

CAPs are made up of partnerships between retailers, local authorities, police, schools, neighbourhood groups and health providers, working together to empower communities to tackle alcohol-related harm to young people and improve the quality of life for residents.

Andy Simms of Spectrum Community Health CIC is co-ordinator of the Wakefield Central and Castleford CAPs, which work closely with Airedale Academy. He says: "This award is so well deserved and reflects the hard work the Academy has done. Their commitment to making positive changes to young people's lives and to the success of the partnerships shines through in everything they do."

ALTON TOWERS FORENSICS 'SUB-STRAIN' TRIP


13 Y9 students embarked on a forensics trip to Alton Towers on Tuesday 2<mark>3 October. As part of the</mark> trip, students took part in a forensic investigation with the help of PhD students of Staffordshire Universities. At the start of the challenge, the students saw a video blog of a scientist who had gone missing. Their task was to unravel the clues to solve the mystery. The students were split up into 4 teams and raced against the clock to investigate the crime scene and analyse a whole host of evidence, such as fingerprints, footprints, samples of liquids, written notes and using UV lighting to scour the scene for extra clues. The Yellow team blitzed through the clues to finish the challenge in less than 20 minutes. The university staff were extremely impressed and said that it usually takes teams more than 40 minutes to complete the challenge and commented how they worked well as a team to be methodical scientists. As winners of the challenge, the Yellow team were awarded fast-passes for the rides for the rest of the day! It was a fantastic day and the students were a credit to the academy.

STUDENTS BEAT STAFF AT ESCAPE ROOM!

Seven Y11 students visited the Escapologist in Xscape during half-term to take on our staff and four ex-students in a 'staff vs students' showdown. The seven Y11 students ventured into an arcticthemed room called Frozen in Time and had one hour to solve all the puzzles in order to escape. The students blitzed through the puzzles to finish in 40 minutes and 3 seconds, leaving an amazing 19 minutes and 57 seconds on the clock. The staff and ex-students, on the other-hand, entered an MI5 secret agent room called 'Secret Service: Winter Fall' who had to eliminate suspects to escape. The staff finished two minutes later in a very respectable 42 minutes and 13 seconds. The gamemasters commented that both teams worked well and communicated fantastically with each other. The students will be looking for a similar result again in December, when the game rooms will be reversed!

This has opened up lots of exciting opportunities for us to be able to promote jobs and careers in Health and Social Care with our students so as a follow up event we have just had a careers showcase event in school. This event brought together all the employers who have worked with us previously and also included staff from local universities. Health and Social Care students in Years 9 - 12 were able to speak to people about the jobs they do and also find out more about routes into jobs such as nursing, social work and community care. All went away with lots of useful information as well as bags full of leaflets and pens!

A number of off site visits have taken place recently with some of our Year 13 students receiving their Progression Module Plus awards at Leeds City Museum. This was a lovely event and gave students the opportunity to meet other students from around Yorkshire.





It has been another very busy term for the Sixth Form. Student numbers are high and we have embarked upon an exciting collaboration with Castleford Tigers Category 3 Academy.

We are currently hosting their students who are studying for the Level 3 Extended Diploma in Sport as well as benefiting from the coaching, resources and facilities that the Tigers have to offer. This is now open for our current Year 11 students to apply for and also means that our students on other Level 3 courses such as Health & Social Care, Business Studies and Performing Arts, can benefit as well. There will be opportunities for them to play or benefit in other ways such as having access to their strength and conditioning team.

Most recently all of our Performing Arts students visited the Create Your Future convention in Manchester, where they spent time finding out about HE and Theatre school opportunities across the country.
